## Program Objectives

This conference is designed for professionals working with children and families, including: law enforcement personnel, physicians, nurses, mental health professionals, protective services workers, prevention specialists, attorneys, teachers, social workers, psychologists and psychiatrists.

This course offers up-to-date information on prevention, assessment, intervention and treatment of child abuse and neglect. Twenty workshops are available to meet the needs of professionals from varied disciplines and with differing levels of experience. Participants can choose from such topics as alcohol, anger and abuse and forensic interviewing in Michigan. # Workshops

## WORKSHOPS-SESSION I

- 1. Taking Care of Me: Building Self-Nurturing Skills as a Professional**  
Nurturing one's self as a professional is the most important skill necessary to remain an energetic, enthusiastic help to clients. This workshop will discuss ways to practice nurturing one's self.

- 2. Forensic Interviewing in Michigan**  
An overview of the protocol that has been developed for the State of Michigan that will implement the forensic interviewing process. Training curriculum and how the program will be evaluated for its effectiveness will also be presented.

- 3. Brittle Bone Disease?**  
Osteogenesis Imperfecta is a disease associated with bone fragility. The disease is caused by abnormalities in the synthesis of Type I collagen, a protein that is widely distributed in the body. The disease has variable severity and occurs in families with different patterns of inheritance. Recent controversy involves the existence of a temporary form of the disease and its differentiation from non-accidental trauma.

- 4. Project SEEK-Prevention Stops Prisons from Growing**  
Project SEEK is a comprehensive prevention program which targets children of inmates by reducing risk and increasing protective factors. The workshop will describe core principles and central elements of the program that lead to its effectiveness. Mechanics of implementation and evaluation results will be highlighted.

- 5. Multisystemic Therapy: A Last Chance Alternative to Residential Treatment**  
Multisystemic Therapy (MST) is a short-term intensive home-based treatment being used specifically with adjudicated delinquent youth. We will talk about how the treatment focuses on making changes in the family, school, peers and other systems involved in the youth's life as a means to effecting positive change in the delinquent youth's behavior. The program has served delinquent youth with a variety of troubling behaviors from repeat status offenders to youth with charges of assault, sex offending, and other serious offenses. Collaboration of the professionals involved (Court, CMH, FIA, schools, and other private agencies) is an integral part of the treatment's success.

## WORKSHOPS-SESSION II

- 1. Alcohol, Anger, and Abuse**  
The abuse of children in combination with the abuse of alcohol is a well documented occurrence. This workshop will address both the awareness and recognition of substance abuse/child abuse through discussion and practice. Topics include ways to increase parents' awareness of the relationship between drinking and parenting and information for professionals on recognizing symptoms of alcohol-related child abuse.

- 2. Group Treatment for Sexually Abused Children**  
This workshop will discuss the formation of groups (children and teens), special considerations, group program, session focus, and specific techniques.

- 3. Documentation in Child Sexual Abuse: The Medical Evaluation and Videocolposcopy**  
The medical evaluation continues to carry special significance in the assessment of child sexual abuse. A thorough knowledge of developmental ano-genital anatomy is required to properly identify, assess, and record physical findings associated with abuse. While not essential to perform an evaluation, a videocolposcope enhances visualization and documentation of these dynamic structures, allowing unique opportunities for professional education and patient comfort. We will discuss the role of videocolposcopy in improving the medical assessment and documentation of child sexual abuse.

- 4. The Role of the Non-Attorney Professional in Child Protection Proceedings**  
This workshop will provide an overview of various stages of proceedings from the preliminary hearing through disposition and the role of the non-attorney expert/professional at each stage. The presentation will include discussion of the newly produced State Bar video on testifying in court.

- 5. Network Centers: Collaborating at the Neighborhood Level to Deliver Services**  
The North Neighborhood Network Center in Lansing is an example of how neighborhoods and providers of service can collaborate to provide services for the prevention of child abuse and neglect. Many agencies and groups have come together, including the neighborhood associations, Ingham County FIA, Ingham County Health Department, Lansing Public Schools, Lansing Community Policing Officers, St. Lawrence Hospital, Capital Area Community Services, MSU Extension Services, Highfields, CASA, Family Violence Coordinating Committee, Ingham County Friend of the Court, Food Movers, Federal Commodities Program, among others. ## WORKSHOPS-SESSION III

- 1. Responding to Substance Abusing Parents: The Parents' Perspectives of What Works**  
This workshop is premised on the belief that parents in recovery serve as an important source of information about what works. Following a brief review of the nature of addiction and family dynamics, the workshop will focus on learnings from parents which were gathered from parent interviews. Workshop participants will learn about parents' experiences with addiction and the child welfare system, and how they successfully reunified their families and created new lifestyles of recovery. Other topics will be reviewed including: how workers identify substance abuse, deal with denial, and key points on recovery and relapse. Based on the lessons of this workshop, participants will also discuss how child and family service agencies can plan for permanency with families who have substance abuse problems. A packet of detailed handouts will be provided.

- 2. Sexual Abuse From a Child's View**  
Children often don't have the language skills or understanding to assist workers in opening up their world of abuse. Ms. Silverman, an award winning author, and incest survivor, will discuss her experiences. These experiences will bring into focus the child's perspective of sexual abuse and how workers can help children feel comfortable talking about what is happening in their lives.

- 3. Creating Community Networks at the Local Level**  
This session will highlight three community-level initiatives to prevent child abuse and neglect in Kent County: Kent County Healthy Start, a support to all families who have babies, Perspective 21, Recommendation #5, a Children's Protective Services response to reports by mandated reporters; and the Child and Family Resource Council, a community network to prevent child abuse and neglect. Each of these has varying proportions of private and public partnership.

- 4. Videotaping of Child Sexual Abuse Interviews: The Pros and Cons**  
Videotaping is one of the most controversial issues in the development of community protocols for interviewing sexually assaulted/abused children. This workshop will present pros and cons of videotaping and share the experience of the presenter in developing a videotaping protocol with a multi-disciplinary team. The workshop is designed to be a stimulus for dialogue for multi-disciplinary teams and agencies approaching this controversial decision.

- 5. Decreasing Sexual Abuse by Working with Adolescent Sex Offenders**  
This presentation will focus on advanced group skills with adolescent sex offenders. The presentation will cover several group issues including: how to deal with constantly changing open groups in relation to group level and individual member treatment goal accomplishment; how much time to spend on offender victimization and the use of psychodrama in group as a tool for working on denial. This will be a combined discussion and experiential workshop.

Not a "how to" for anything practical, but a look at recent trends in biology, genetics, and paleoanthropology regarding what babies have to tell us about the really big questions, like how we came to be the self-conscious, loving, anxious, social and warlike species we seem to be.

- 4. The Families for Kids/Community Compact (An Alternative to the Traditional Foster Care System)**  
This program has been modeled after the New Zealand approach, working with families in the Maui Tribe. This innovative approach is designed to involve extended families in the decision making process around permanency planning for children who normally would go through the traditional route of the child welfare system, (i.e.: foster care). Information will be given about how referrals are received, what steps are taken to follow up the referral, the four phases of the compact process (the actual family meeting), and the case management of the family plan.

- 5. Day One: A Collaborative, Home-Based Healthy Families Model**  
This workshop will explore how one community has worked together to provide a successful collaborative, home-based prevention program. Day One, Healthy Families Northeast Michigan, targets families who are identified at birth by hospital staff potentially at risk for CAN. The long-term comprehensive, family centered services are provided by a multi-disciplinary team made up of both professionals and paraprofessionals. Discussion will also include how the program has effectively blended with MSS/ ISS.

Participants will be able to recognize child abuse in sports, ethical and unethical coaching practices, and ways parents and coaches can work together. They will increase their understanding of child abuse in children's sports.

Child abuse creates extreme stress not only for its victims but also for those who work with them. This workshop will review the effects of chronic stress on our bodies and minds. It will then describe ways to reduce stress through the practice of meditation. The workshop will include a fifteen minute guided meditation.

This session will present an overview of Kent County's experience in setting up a child death review team along with helps and challenges from the other pilot programs state-wide.

- 4. Strength-Based Practice for Fieldworkers: Techniques for Raising Cooperation and Motivation**  
This workshop is offered for the worker and supervisor who are in direct contact with families. It will focus on techniques rather than theory so that fieldworkers can take helpful methods back to their jobs. Learn how to interview to begin behavior change. Review fifteen techniques that raise cooperation and motivation. Discuss strategies that will help families focus on strengths and solutions. Begin to use what forty years of motivational research has been suggesting for working with families that may not want to work with you! Also included will be ideas on using creative brainstorming with families.

- 5. I Am Your Child**  
Recent research on infant's brain development and the importance of the first three years of life have brought to the forefront what child development experts have been saying for years. 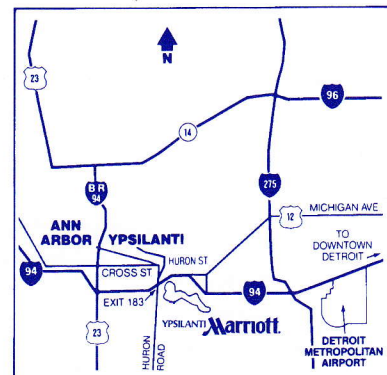

### Located in Ypsilanti Directions

Located at Interstate 94 and Huron Street, Ypsilanti Marriott is serenely situated within the privacy of a 186 acre resort setting, away from the city traffic, adjacent to Ann Arbor, yet fifteen minutes away from Detroit Metropolitan International Airport. Transportation is available between the hotel and the airport. There is regularly-scheduled Commuter Transportation Company van service available on the hour from 7:00 am to 12 midnight.
