Welcome to the 18th Annual Statewide Conference.

Our Tuesday keynote speaker is Dr. Donna Rosenberg. Dr. Rosenberg has extensive experience in the area of child abuse and neglect. Her presentation will focus on child neglect. Both Drs. Rosenberg and Trout will be presenting workshops in addition to their general sessions.

Over 25 workshops are available from which to choose. Experts from across the country will present information in a mixture of educational sessions such as keynotes, general sessions and workshops, using audio-visual aids, question and answer sessions and lectures. In addition, each conference participant will receive a course syllabus that includes outlines and articles from many of the presenters.

All conference participants are invited to attend, free of charge, two interesting presentations sponsored by the Michigan Professional Society on the Abuse of Children on the evening of the first day of the conference.

At the end of the conference, we hope that you will have built on your existing knowledge of abuse and neglect by increasing concrete skills, that you will have developed new perspectives in your work with children and families and that you will have had the opportunity to network with other professionals to share ideas and resources.

WORKSHOP SESSION I – Monday Morning

1. Questions and Answers with Dave Pelzer — 10:45-11:30

This is a 45-minute session. If you attend this session, this is the only workshop you can attend during this time. Due to Dave's popularity and highly inspirational life story, people from all walks of life have questions about him. He will answer any questions people have and utilize the answers to reinforce the message from the keynote address.

2. New Research in Infant Brain Development — 10:45-12:15

Infancy research – especially the recent advances in brain research – have helped us to comprehend both the adaptability of humans, and the intransigence of certain behaviors and working models that began in infancy. The notion that trauma, for example, is a neurophysiological event, both frightens us and gives us clues regarding its treatment.

3. Family Group Decision-Making: Values and Skills to Enhance Safety and Family Responsibility — 10:45-12:15

This workshop will introduce Family Group Decision-Making (FGDM). There will be an overview of the values, procedures and skills for conducting family group conferences. 5. Juvenile Sex Offenders: From Broken Boys to Mending Men: The Community-Based Experience — 10:45-12:15

1. Psychological/Developmental Sequelae to Foster Care and Adoption: How Does Life Work Out? — 3:00-4:30

How can we understand these connections – between early experience and later life – more clearly?

KEYNOTE — Child Neglect - Definition and Intervention — 9:00-10:15

In this keynote session, child neglect will be treated as a diagnosis as specific as other physical forms of maltreatment. Useful definitions of nutritional neglect, supervision neglect, medical care neglect, schooling neglect and emotional/development neglect will be presented. While some interventions are attractive in theory, this presentation will emphasize those treatment techniques that are practical and realistically applicable.

The consequences to the fetus of exposure to alcohol and different drugs will be reviewed. This workshop will separate fact from fiction and participants will be brought up to date on the latest in pediatric literature on this subject.

2. Law Enforcement's Response to Child Sexual Assault Investigations — Part I — 10:30-12:00

This presentation will involve the detailed discussion of the child sexual assault process and its cumulative effect on the investigation of child sexual assault investigations. 3. Music for Fun and Emotional Bonding — 10:30-12:00

Many activities and ideas for musical fun with children and families (including high-risk families) will be presented. When music is a part of the infant-parent/caregiver relationship, trust develops and love grows. This workshop will provide ways to help parents enjoy music with their children. The workshop will include how music can positively affect language, social, and psycho-motor development, concentration, and self-esteem for child and parent. Children's books, the use of puppets and homemade instruments will be included. Participants will discover their own musical memories and gifts.

4. Asking Children Focused Questions About Child Maltreatment and Endangerment — 10:30-12:00

The workshop will be skill-based and will present a strategy for asking open-ended but focused questions about experiences in their lives. These include maltreating experiences such as physical neglect, emotional abuse, physical abuse, and sexual abuse. Focused questions about child endangerment, such as parental domestic violence, substance abuse, mental problems, and criminal activity will also be covered. Videotaped examples will be used.

5. Head Injuries: The Shaken Baby Syndrome and Falls: What Do We Know About the Mechanism of Injury? — 10:30-12:00

The mechanism of head injury will be reviewed along with what we know about the mechanics of head injuries as it affects Shaken Baby Syndrome. The shape and composition of the immature brain gives it different mechanical properties from an adult brain. Thus, how the brain changes with growth explains many of the physical findings caused by trauma, while the size and shape of the infant explains others. This workshop will attempt to survey the current research literature of head injuries in infants, to provide an accessible explanation of the mechanism of injury. The interrelationship between structure and susceptibility to subdural hemorrhage, subarachnoid hemorrhage, diffuse axonal injury, and cerebral edema will be clarified.

6. Building Strong Families — A Parenting Program that Works! — 10:30-12:00

There is probably no other career more people undertake with less preparation than parenthood. Building Strong Families is an innovative parenting program, developed by Michigan State University Extension, that is targeted at limited-resource parents with children 0-3. The program's mission is to help parents and caregivers help their children reach their fullest potential. It helps parents gain knowledge and improve their skills so they can be more effective parents. The program is currently conducted in 43 Michigan counties, and across the United States. This session will review the components of the program, including recent evaluation, as well as highlight where the program can be accessed in Michigan.

3. How to Administer the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASP) – Part I — 1:00-2:30

This workshop will introduce the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ), a parent-completed developmental monitoring guide. The ASQ is an effective screening tool to identify infants and young children who require further developmental evaluation. Because parents know their child's abilities best, ASQ relies on parent observations, as well as professional or paraprofessional observations. Parents, paraprofessionals and professionals can administer this tool. The ASQ can be used with children from 4 months to 4 years of age at 4 to 6 month intervals. Scoring is quick and intervention ideas can be drawn from the Hawaii Early Learning Profile (HELP) at Home.

3. How to Administer the Ages and Stages Questionnaire – Part II — 2:45-4:15

This workshop will introduce the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ), a parent-completed developmental monitoring guide. The ASQ is an effective screening tool to identify infants and young children who require further developmental evaluation. Because parents know their child's abilities best, ASQ relies on parent observations, as well as professional or paraprofessional observations. Parents, paraprofessionals and professionals can administer this tool. The ASQ can be used with children from 4 months to 4 years of age at 4 to 6 month intervals. Scoring is quick and intervention ideas can be drawn from the Hawaii Early Learning Profile (HELP) at Home.

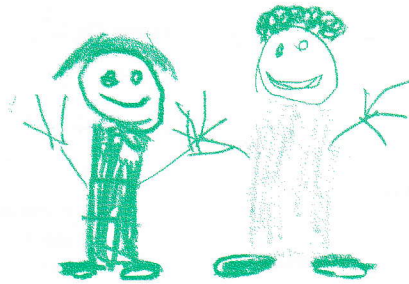

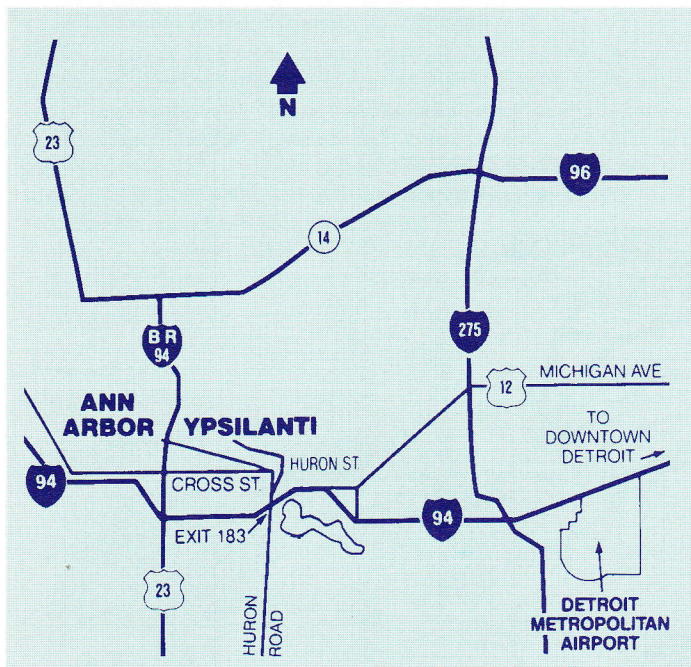
Travel and Lodging
