## **Keynote Presentation, 9:00 - 10:15am:**

### **Confronting Child Neglect: Concepts and Challenges**

This presentation will tackle key concepts and challenges as we seek better ways to address child neglect.

## **WORKSHOP SESSION I: 10:30 - 12:00**

### **1. Fatalities Due to Child Neglect**

This workshop will offer a framework for approaching child fatalities that are related to neglect.

### **2. Forensic Interviewing with Reticent Children**

Most child forensic interviewing research has been about children who are ready and able to talk. This workshop focuses on nondisclosing, reticent, and recanting children. We will examine current controversies about children's disclosure, nondisclosure and recantation rates in child maltreatment cases and will review the variables that affect disclosure patterns. Current strategies for dealing with reticent children will be presented and evaluated.

### **3. Motivational Interviewing For Child Welfare:**

#### **Increasing the Readiness to Change**

The good news from the Motivational Interviewing (MI) approach is that we don't have to wait around for a client to "get motivated." Motivation is a state, and a state that can be influenced. MI is a way of talking with clients that builds internal motivation for change. This workshop will outline how to help parents and families build commitment and reach a decision to change. Learn how to pull "change talk" from a challenging client and increase the behavior change dimensions of "Importance, Confidence and Readiness." Stop the arguing and reasoning—when MI is done correctly, the client presents the arguments for change!

### **4. Child Interventions in Domestic Violence**

This workshop will assist participants in identifying the factors that may facilitate success for children exposed to domestic violence. To do so requires that professionals capture the child's complete story. Discussion will center on the variables in children's exposure to and experiences associated with domestic violence, including specific elements of a child's environment that can serve as supportive factors used in designing appropriate interventions.

### **5. Aging Out**

This workshop will discuss the preparation of youth in out-of-home care, typically foster care, to become independently functioning adults. The format will include: knowledge and information dissemination, exercises and activities, and guided interaction.

### **1. Failure to Thrive and Child Neglect**

This workshop will cover the relationship between failure to thrive and child neglect, and offer an approach to these issues.

### **2. Understanding Sudden Unexpected Infant Deaths - Using Michigan's Protocol on Infant Death Investigation and Doll Re-enactment**

Clay Jansson will discuss infant and child death scene investigation from the role of law enforcement. This will include: dispatch, securing the scene, interviewing caregivers, approaches to voluntary search vs. search warrants, collection of evidence, documenting findings, photographing or videotaping the scene and more.

The second presentation by Patricia Tackitt will focus on infant death investigation using Michigan's Sudden Unexpected Infant Death protocol and doll re-enactment with the family to show what actually happened to the baby. This approach will be used to highlight what the medical examiner needs from the scene on SUIDs to accurately determine cause and manner of death. Public Health prevention will also be discussed.

## 3. Child Sexual Behavior: What's Normal?

## 4. Myths and Errors in Child Sexual Abuse Medical Assessments

This presentation will review what we know (and do not know) about the medical evaluation for suspected child sexual abuse. It will include new guidelines concerning the interpretation of physical examination findings and potentially sexually transmitted infections. Recent evidence concerning forensic evidence and legal outcomes will also be addressed. This presentation will include photographs of anogenital injuries and findings which can be confused for trauma.

### 1. The Killer Bs: Bruises, Bumps and Burns

In the world of child abuse pediatrics, everyone is sensitive to curious skin findings in children. This workshop will cover bruises, bumps and burns that are both common and uncommon in children. The workshop will include case discussions with pictures to assist with identification and diagnosis. This workshop is designed for clinicians and non-clinicians alike.

### 2. Kids Go to Court

This workshop will provide information about abused children and the role of professionals in preparing them for testifying in court. ## 3. Methamphetamine in Michigan and the Department of Human Services Protocol

This presentation will discuss the history of methamphetamine, its effects on the user and the dangers of a meth lab to the cooker, first responders and general public. Participants will also be introduced to the Department of Human Services Methamphetamine Protocol and give guidelines on what DHS workers should do when they believe they have discovered a meth lab.

# Workshops - Tuesday, October 17

## Keynote Presentation, 9:00 - 10:15am:

### Maltreated Infants and Young Children – What Do We See, What Do They Need?

The type of attachment relationships that a child forms in their first two years hold a lifetime of consequences, for better or for worse. This keynote will address the typical adaptive relationship strategies for infants and toddlers subject to abuse, neglect, trauma and domestic violence. These strategies, if misunderstood and mismanaged, can cause later maladaptive behavior. When foster and adoptive parents, educators, physicians and child welfare professionals understand the attachment template for children in the welfare system, it is easier to develop parenting and educational strategies that can help children thrive.

## WORKSHOP SESSION IV: 10:30 - 12:00

### 1. Grieving Infants and Toddlers: Helping Young Children When They Must Move

Infants and toddlers express grief, loss and trauma in ways that are expressed differently than older children. This workshop will use video and case discussion to explore assessment and response to infants who are grieving. Concrete recommendations for meeting their needs during this time will be addressed.

### 2. Conducting a Comprehensive Forensic Evaluation of Parents Suspected of Munchausen by Proxy Abuse

This workshop will detail the medical and psychological components of a forensic evaluation of suspected Munchausen by Proxy Abuse. The role of Protective Service and Foster Care workers as well as the role of the Prosecuting Attorney will also be presented. Case examples will be used to illustrate the assessment methods outlined.

### 3. Working with Your Prosecuting Attorney

This workshop will deal with concerns of meeting with the Prosecuting Attorney to prepare both yourself and the victim for trial. This includes: development of trial strategy, witness preparation, and review of what the witness and victim can anticipate. It will also address issues of discovery and evidence rules related to witnesses and the process of the case through the legal system, including items such as: the charging decision, sentence guidelines, plea policies and others.

### 4. The Problem with Parenting: Overcoming Cultural Barriers

This workshop will address the issues of cultural barriers as they relate to intervention for families of color, families in crisis and single parents. This workshop will provide a better understanding of how cultural trends and perceptions can become barriers in reaching and connecting with these diverse populations. Attendees will gain a better understanding of challenges faced by these populations and gain skills to build a more culturally aware and empathic relationship with these families.

## Plenary Presentation, 1:00 - 2:00pm:

### Don't Manage Your Stress – Rekindle Your Spirit

The most popular of Dr. Sheperd's presentations, this is definitely not your typical "Managing Stress" seminar. Dr. Sheperd actually uses these "typical" presentations as examples of what is wrong with the way we look at stress.

"Stress is an overused and misused word," according to Dr. Sheperd. "Learning how to manage your stress sounds like a lesson in how to be more organized with your misery."

Dr. Sheperd uses a humorous but thought provoking approach that both challenges the audience to accept responsibility for their own lives, and gives them strategies to improve the quality of those lives.

"The specific situations people are facing are not as critical to me as what they bring to those situations. All of us are facing life, whether it's a changing workplace, job layoffs, serious illness, or other personal problems. Our attitudes, the way we think, what we value, and how hard we are willing to work, all determine how we are going to handle those situations."

"Rekindling the Spirit is about rediscovering our own power in our lives, the importance of being there for each other, and our passion for living, working, and making a difference."

### 4. Survivor Moms: Narratives of Trauma-Related Concerns in Childbearing and Early Parenting

The goal of this workshop is to provide organizing frameworks to guide assessment, individual interventions, and program design possibilities for pregnant and parenting "survivor moms." This information will be useful to professionals in both childbearing and mental health professions, and there will be an emphasis on facilitating collaborations across settings. The strategies presented will be based on data from two qualitative studies of narrative accounts of sexual abuse survivors' experiences during the childbearing year. The workshop format will include: an overview of how abuse-related post-traumatic concerns manifest in the childbearing year and in relation to parenting; a description of what trauma-related desires for care the women expressed; practical assessment strategies to distinguish priority needs for women survivors; individual intervention and program-development ideas; and attention to practical issues that affect interdisciplinary collaboration for care of trauma survivors and their infants in a range of settings. Each topic will be illustrated with material from research projects. Bibliographic resources, national organization websites, and screening instruments will be shared as well.

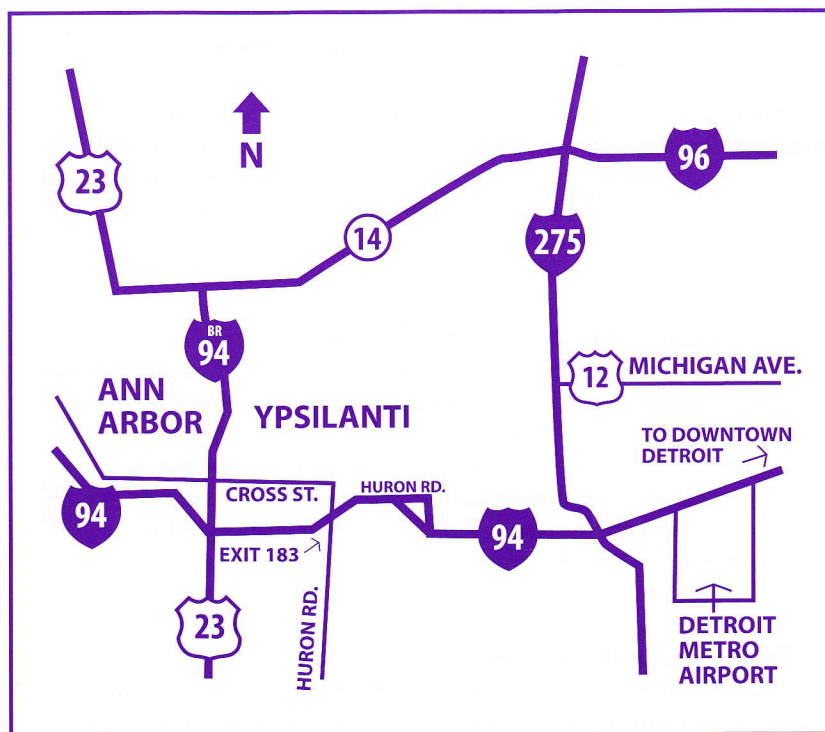
# Travel and Lodging
