Program Overview

You are invited to the Michigan Statewide Conference on Child Abuse and Neglect, October 17-18, 2011, as we celebrate our 30th year. During this two-day course, we will provide a great opportunity to address challenges as the latest issues are presented by national and regional experts. Noted keynote and plenary presenters will discuss important topics, as will numerous workshop presenters. We have heard from you through your conference evaluations and will focus on many of your suggestions. You will gain knowledge about practice in our field of child abuse and neglect throughout the conference.

Keynote and Plenary Presenters:

Robert Anda, MD, MS, Co-Principal Investigator, ACE Study, will present *Health and Social Impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences Throughout the Lifespan*. The *Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)* study focuses on the relationship of childhood abuse, neglect, domestic violence and related experiences to health throughout the lifespan. Dr. Anda will also discuss *Barriers to Change*, a public health perspective on adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) in a Monday morning workshop.

Paula McLain, MFA, professor and renowned author, will present during the plenary session on Tuesday afternoon, citing from her memoir, *Like Family*, with: "How Do You Stay Grounded When You're Only Passing Through? A Foster-Care Survivor Shares Her Thoughts About Home, Hope and the Power of Resilience."

Andrew M. Baker, MD, will present *Asphyxial Death in Infants and Children* in the Tuesday morning keynote discussing child asphyxia, including asphyxial deaths in infants in the sleeping environment, addressing SIDS, sudden unexplained infant death, cosleeping, bedsharing, positional asphyxia, and overlaying, as well as investigation and documentation in these cases. *Unusual Child Deaths* is the topic Dr. Baker will discuss during a later Tuesday morning workshop presentation.

Target Audience:

The course is designed for participants who are: social workers; child welfare specialists in child abuse and neglect, prevention, foster care, adoption and juvenile justice services; physicians, nurses, mental health and other medical professionals; law enforcement, attorneys, judges, child advocates, and educators.

Conference Goals:

At the conclusion of the conference, participants will:

- Have knowledge about the most recent advances in the field and application to practice
- Recognize symptoms of abused and neglected children in complex presentations
- Understand the source of child behavior when children are abused and neglected
- Be able to successfully intervene and plan treatment for children
- Understand successful prevention models in child abuse and neglect

At the end of the first day of the conference, you are invited to attend the annual meeting of Michigan Professional Society on the Abuse of Children (MiPSAC), which is the state-recognized chapter of the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children (APSAC). This important organization focuses on meeting the needs of professionals who practice in areas of child maltreatment. Monday, October 17, 2011

Keynote Presentation: 9:00 am - 10:15 am

The Health and Social Impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences Throughout the Lifespan

Presenter: Robert F. Anda, MD, MS

The ACE Study demonstrates the relationship of childhood abuse, neglect, domestic violence and related experiences to health throughout the lifespan among more than 17,000 members of the Kaiser Health Plan. The findings are consistent with recent discoveries about the neurobiology of stress and the effect of stress on the developing central nervous system.

Unlike other studies, the ACE study assessed a wide array of traumatic childhood experiences as well as many behavioral, health, and social problems from adolescence to late adulthood. The number of ACEs has a graded relationship to many common medical and public health problems. An overview of these concepts and findings from the study will be presented.

Workshop Session I: 10:30 am - 12:00 pm

1. Barriers to Change — A Public Health Perspective on ACEs

Presenter: Robert F. Anda, MD, MS

Work in the field of child abuse and neglect frequently encounters barriers to change that need to be understood in order to be surmounted. Laying out these adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) as the nation's leading public health problem is a model that will be presented.

This workshop will review common barriers and present a public health framework for getting traction. An example of a successful model that has used a public health approach and community "grassroots" work will be reviewed. Use of applied public health surveillance (surveys) will be highlighted as an approach to the common barriers to change.

2. The ABCs of Evidence-Based Programs and Practices

Presenter: Alicia Luckie

This workshop will provide a general overview of evidence-based and evidence-informed programs and practices in child maltreatment prevention. Organizations will learn how to identify these programs using web-based tools and resources and learn the process involved in selecting an appropriate program or practice for your community.

3. Body Safety Training for Preschoolers

Presenters: Marcia Dykstra; Amy J. Dalman

This presentation will discuss an evidence-based personal safety program aimed at children ages 3-7. The safety program focuses on using short increments, concrete concepts, repetition and reinforcement.

4. "The Happiest Baby on the Block"- Techniques to Calm Crying and Help Babies Sleep Longer

Presenter: Jennifer Pantoja, RN, BSN

The Happiest Baby on the Block as developed by pediatrician, Dr. Harvey Karp, teaches parents 5 simple steps ("The 5 S's" - Swaddling, Side-lying, Swinging, Shushing, and Sucking) to trigger a baby's Calming Reflex and help baby sleep longer. Participants will have the opportunity to practice the 5 S's and learn the rationale behind these techniques. A brief review of current research on prolonged crying and its relationship to Shaken Baby Syndrome will also be reviewed. Open discussion is encouraged.



5. Worker Safety

Presenter: Sgt. Joshua Lator

This presentation will focus on a personal safety for field staff that handle child abuse and neglect cases. The course will be applicable for all attendees.

6. How Young Children "Tell" Us Their Feelings

Presenter: Julie Ribaudo, LMSW, ACSW, IMH-E (IV)

Children who have experienced early neglect and abuse create representations of themselves and their world based on a lens of lack of certainty about safety and comfort. They may lack the words to tell us how they feel but their interactions with us can. Early experiences of persistent unmet needs and/or unremitting distress create interactions with caregivers that can elicit the same feelings of confusion, despair, loneliness and rage that the child feels. This workshop will highlight the internal working models of abused and neglected children and how caregivers and interventionists can actively work to understand and resist confirming negative self-models.

7. Issues and Ideas for Forensic Interviewers: A Roundtable Discussion

Presenters: Breah Groen; Barbara J. Welke, LMSW

This will be a roundtable discussion of techniques, problems, and solutions relevant to child forensic interviewers. Facilitated by two experienced forensic interview specialists, the goals of this session will be to provide participants with a forum for engaging in debate about best practices; for finding creative solutions to the problems we deal with each day in our jobs; and for networking with others in their field. Current research on best practices in interviewing will be provided.

Workshop Session II: 1:00 pm - 2:30 pm

1. The Deadly Bath – Part 1

Presenters: Linda Crouch; Linda DeVries, LMSW; Renae Hyde; Jeffrey Jentzen, MD, PhD; Bethany Mohr, MD, FAAP

The workshop is the first of two consecutive sessions that examines the death of a child and highlights the multi-interdisciplinary nature of child abuse investigations. Attendance at both workshops is strongly recommended. This presentation will begin with a detailed introduction to the case by the University of Michigan Child Protection Team, followed by presentations from other involved disciplines, including: Children's Protective Services (Foster Care), Law Enforcement, and the Medical Examiner. Time for discussion will be allotted. This workshop is appropriate for all conference attendees.

2. The Next Step: Implementing an Evidence-Based Program

Presenter: Alicia Luckie

This workshop will provide an overview of resources that are needed to plan for implementation and sustainability of a quality evidence-based program. It will discuss the importance of implementation drivers and the stages of successful implementation for child maltreatment prevention programs.

3. Putting the Strengthening Families Five Protective Factors Model into Practice

Presenter: Joyce A. Bos, MA

The presentation will provide an overview of the Strengthening Families Model as well as how the Western Michigan Child Maltreatment Prevention Team is utilizing the protective factors model for regional planning and training. Participants will learn how to incorporate this model into community action plans.

4. Methamphetamine Awareness

Presenter: D/Lt. Anthony Saucedo

This presentation will focus on the current trends in methamphetamine use, indicators, effects, and safety for first responders.

5. Assessing the Needs of Relative and Foster Home Providers

Presenter: Nancy Rostoni, MSW

There are few more important decisions in Child Welfare than finding the best place for a child who has been removed from a parent. Even when we find that placement, there are almost always going to be additional needs. This workshop will focus on how we can complete evaluations that are thorough; ongoing assessments of the needs of the entire family; and provide support through a time that is oftentimes difficult but so very important for the child.

6. Darkness to Light: Stewards of Children

Presenter: Amy J. Dalman

This workshop will take a direct and comprehensive approach to the problem of sexual abuse. The program will educate steps that can be taken to prevent, recognize and react responsibly to the reality of sexual child abuse.

Workshop Session III: 2:45 pm - 4:15 pm

1. Medical Child Abuse: Redefining Munchausen Syndrome by Proxy

Presenter: Lisa Markman, MD, FAAP

This presentation will cover the latest in medical studies and practice to answer questions frequently raised during investigations and trials. Questions explored will include: Are findings related to the frequency and type of abuse? How can we maximize medical findings? What is the value of the medical history? What types of evidence may be overlooked? How solid is our medical evidence and where are the controversies? The overall goal is to give investigators, lawyers and frontline medical providers tools to better care for and protect children.

2. Building Community Awareness with a Shout and a Whisper

Presenters: Traci Riehl; Rochelle Rizzi

Building community awareness today requires a multi-faceted approach. This interactive session will provide you with tips and tools to build a consistent message. Topics covered include: the roles of social media, web presence, media relations, marketing materials and purposeful news events.

3. Strengthening Families: Where Do I Begin? An Introduction to Parent Cafés and Community Engagement

Presenter: Donna Lackie

Participants will learn about the national Strengthening Families framework and five protective factors that build strong families, promote child development and reduce child abuse and neglect. This interactive session will focus on parent café sessions and community engagement work in Oakland County, Michigan. Tips, tools, and techniques for embedding this research-based, cost-effective, and culturally responsive strategy will be shared.

4. Working with Offending Fathers

Presenter: Robert Ortega, LMSW, PhD

This workshop will present information that helps better understand fathers, their role in child maltreatment and implications for assessment and treatment. Additional implications will be discussed in terms of prevention and additional services necessary to meet the treatment needs of fathers while protecting their children and others in their care.

5. The Deadly Bath – Part 2

Presenters: Linda Crouch; Linda DeVries, LMSW; Renae Hyde; Jeffrey Jentzen, MD, PhD; Bethany Mohr, MD, FAAP

This presentation is a continuation of the multidisciplinary discussion of a child death case from the 1:00 pm session.

Keynote Presentation: 9:00 am - 10:15 am

Asphyxial Death in Infants and Children

Presenter: Andrew M. Baker, MD

Asphyxial Death in Infants and Children will begin with an overview of the classification of asphyxia and how it occurs in all age groups. Focus will then be turned to those types of asphyxia that are more commonly seen in children, and how they are investigated and documented. The talk will conclude with a discussion of asphyxial deaths in infants in the sleeping environment, addressing SIDS, sudden unexplained infant death, co-sleeping, bedsharing, positional asphyxia, and overlaying.

Workshop Session IV: 10:30 am - 12:00 pm

1. Unusual Child Deaths

Presenter: Andrew M. Baker, MD

Unusual Child Deaths will consist of 6-7 case presentations, spanning infancy to the teenage years, in which an unusual, unexpected, or surprising cause of death was eventually uncovered. Some of the cases include homicides, accidents, and naturals. Each case will include a review of the pertinent medical literature.



2. Outcome Measurement Basics: Collecting and Analyzing Data to Tell Your Program's Story

Presenter: Catherine S. Connell LMSW, ACSW

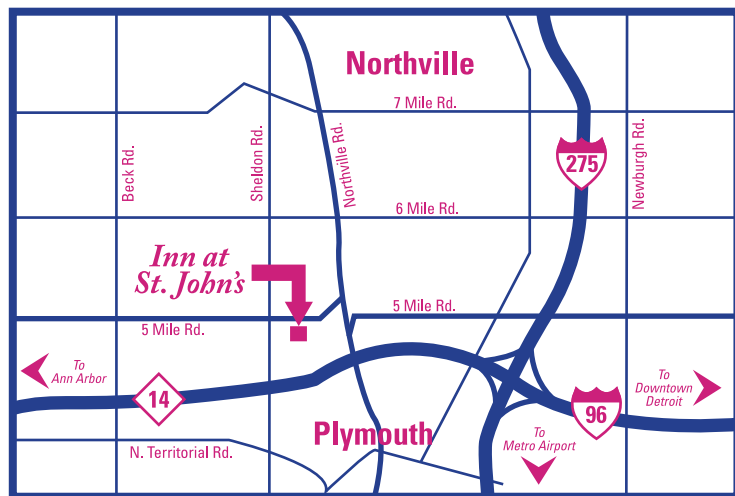
